Since the beginning of the twenty-first century, global infectious disease outbreaks have continued to challenge public health systems and reveal serious limitations in governance, capacity, and coordination. The COVID-19 pandemic, in particular, exposed deficiencies in emergency preparedness across diverse national contexts, underscoring the fragility of even well-resourced systems.

[2] Quarantine was once the cornerstone of international epidemic control, notably during the cholera and plague outbreaks of the 19th century. While the tool remains relevant, it must now be repositioned within a broader global framework that tackles the speed and complexity of pathogen transmission across borders. Integrated surveillance systems, robust data-sharing protocols, and flexible early warning mechanisms are essential to enable swift, evidence-informed responses. Such mechanisms are especially critical in low-resource settings, where capacity gaps often delay effective intervention.

Public health responses must predominantly focus on strengthening system-wide resilience and fostering coordination among national and transnational actors. To remain responsive, health systems must continuously adjust to emerging zoonotic threats, technological disruptions, and environmental change. Incremental reforms are insufficient; what is required is a coordinated redesign that brings institutional capacities into convergence with global standards of preparedness and cooperation.




